

A Reading from the Book of Jeremiah 31:7-14

Thus says the LORD: Sing aloud with gladness for Jacob, and raise shouts for the chief of the nations; proclaim, give praise, and say, "Save, O LORD, your people, the remnant of Israel." See, I am going to bring them from the land of the north, and gather them from the farthest parts of the earth, among them the blind and the lame, those with child and those in labor, together; a great company, they shall return here.

With weeping they shall come, and with consolations I will lead them back, I will let them walk by brooks of water, in a straight path in which they shall not stumble; for I have become a father to Israel, and Ephraim is my firstborn.

Hear the word of the LORD, O nations, and declare it in the coastlands far away; say, "He who scattered Israel will gather him, and will keep him as a shepherd a flock." For the LORD has ransomed Jacob, and has redeemed him from hands too strong for him.

They shall come and sing aloud on the height of Zion, and they shall be radiant over the goodness of the LORD, over the grain, the wine, and the oil, and over the young of the flock and the herd; their life shall become like a watered garden, and they shall never languish again. I will give the priests their fill of fatness, and my people shall be satisfied with my bounty, says the LORD.

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, just as he chose us in Christ before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before him in love. He destined us for adoption as his children through Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will, to the praise of his glorious grace that he freely bestowed on us in the Beloved.

I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they

were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Silent Meditation

The Nicene Creed Spoken by all, standing.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty,

maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

Today's Music:

The idea of a set of variations on a hymn tune probably started with the Dutch composer Jan Pieterszoon Sweelink (1562-1621), so it is no wonder that although the concept spread quickly to Sweelinck's German pupils, and thence to France, the practice has continued to exist in the Netherlands. Relatively recent Dutch church composers that come to my mind are Cor Kee (1900-1997) and his son Piet Kee (1927-2018), and Bernard Smilde (1922-2014), the composer of today's prelude, a set of variations on the French carol *Gloria* (Angels we have heard on high). The variations are highly inventive, but retain that sense of austerity held by much Dutch music. Our hymn this week is the first verse of (480) "When Jesus left his Father's throne" to the blissful English tune *Kingsfold*. It speaks of the humility of the Incarnation, and how Jesus became like us "unhonored and unknown."

The Offertory (if we have one) is one of Johann Pachelbel's (1653-1706) many organ chorale settings. Vom Himmel hoch, da komm ich Herr ("From Heaven above to Earth I come," our hymn #80) – again has an incarnational theme. The tune is one of the best-known German Christmas chorales, still sung in many places all over the world.

The Postlude is by Léon Roques' (1839-1923) who was organist at L'Eglise St. Pierre de Chaillot, a lovely and relatively unknown church in the 16th arrondissement of Paris, near the American Cathedral. It has five domes and a bell tower, and is in the shape of Greek Cross. Roques collected and arranged many old Noëls from all over France – this one from Provence. We associate this tune with the text "Bring a torch, Jeanette, Isabella."
