

It is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times, and in all places, give thanks unto thee, O Lord, holy Father, almighty, everlasting God. Through Jesus Christ our Lord; who rose victorious from the dead, and doth comfort us with the blessed hope of everlasting life; for to thy faithful people, O Lord, life is changed, not ended; and when our mortal body doth lie in death, there is prepared for us a dwelling place eternal in the heavens. And we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; most humbly beseeching thee to grant that, by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his blood, we, and all thy whole Church, may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion.

And here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee; humbly beseeching thee that we, and all others who shall be partakers of this Holy Communion, may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, be filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction, and made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him.

And although we are unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer unto thee any sacrifice, yet we beseech thee to accept this our bounden duty and service, not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offenses, through Jesus Christ our Lord;

By whom, and with whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, all honor and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end. AMEN.

And now, as our Savior Christ hath taught us, we are bold to say,

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. Robert J. "Bob" Friesner, age 77, a resident of North Chelmsford, formerly of Albuquerque, NM, passed away peacefully on Monday, May 9, 2022, at Lowell General Hospital. He was the belove husband of Kathleen A. "Kate" Friesner with whom he shared almost 46 years of marriage.

Bob was born in Pasadena, CA on December 25, 1944, and was raised in Azusa, CA as the only child of the late Samuel R. and Edith (Frank-Jones) Friesner.

He earned a BA in history from UC Riverside, an MA in Asian History from the University of Kansas, and an MBA from UCLA. Bob held various positions in finance and accounting ultimately settling in Albuquerque, NM with his wife where they raised their son Richard.

During his life Bob traveled extensively. Following the completion of his MA, Bob spent two years conducting research on Chinese History in Taiwan on a Fulbright-Hays Scholarship. While there he became fluent in Mandarin which led to him serving as an interpreter for one of the first groups of Chinese National Scholars to visit the U.S. following the opening up of China to the West. He spent extensive time in the Philippines working on a team overseeing the relocation of a power plant from Colorado. Bob and Kate also vacationed in North and Central America, Europe, and Asia. On their trip to the Chinese mainland, the Chinese were wowed by his fluent Mandarin.

Richard's birth drew them both back to their episcopal roots. They worshipped at several churches, spending more than 20 years at St John's Cathedral in Albuquerque, and the last 5 years at All Saint's in Chelmsford. Bob said of his time at St. John's that he held every job possible with the exception of that of ordained priest.

Bob's service to the community was not limited to the church. As a youth he held several leadership positions within his boy scout troop and the Order of the Arrow and served as the Student Body President his senior year of high school. As an adult he spent decades as a member of Civitans where he worked on countless projects, many directed towards children and adults with special needs.

Service was a hallmark of Bob's life and his true passion resided with the Boy Scouts of America which he told Kate "saved him" by providing him with purpose, direction and a support system, following the death of his father when he was in junior high. He has served in various positions at both the pack and troop levels ever since, attending countless meetings, events, and trips both with his son and his grandsons. He was affectionately called "Sir Bob" by the scouts of Troop 77, a name he earned while attending summer camp with them last July. This year he was to receive his 30-year service pin.

After retiring Bob and Kate relocated from Albuquerque to be closer to their two grandsons first to Fredericksburg, VA and most recently to North Chelmsford, MA where he quickly threw himself into service to the community at the Senior Center, All Saints Episcopal Church, Pack 70, and Troop 77.

Other hobbies that Bob enjoyed included gardening, chess, pool, bowling, and golf. He spent hours planning and tending his vegetable garden each year and could be seen completing projects in the yard almost daily. He played chess and poker with his grandsons at the kitchen table, and they loved going to play pool with him at the senior center on early release days from school.

Bob lived by the Scout Oath and embodied the 12 tenets of the Scout Law and as a result his life was full of friendship, fellowship, community, and love.

In addition to his loving wife, Bob leaves his son and daughter-in-law; Richard K. Friesner and Bethany K. Friesner and two cherished grandsons, Benjamin E. & Samuel K. Friesner all of North Chelmsford.


