Rector's Report, The Rev. Sean Maloney

Senior Warden's Report, Danielle Wigmore

Thanks to everyone for supporting me in my new role as Sr. Warden. Accomplishments this year include:

- 1. We lifted COVID restrictions: children are back in church school, coffee hour is back to normal.
- 2. We can celebrate a successful search for a new rector.
- 3. The Living Stones team finished their work and were decommissioned at the end of January 2023.
- 4. A new, environmentally focused ministry has formed: Creation Care
- 5. A new Finance Committee is being formed.
- 6. Troop 70 and Pack 77 Boy Scouts are falling under a new charter agreement with All Saints'

Junior Warden's Report, Benton Burgess is not in attendance. His report was delivered by Danielle Wigmore

My thanks go out to Frank Ouellette, Dave Kuzara, and Chris Mills for doing a lot of work on the building and for being here a lot. Upcoming Projects:

- 1. Fixing the elevator
- 2. Moving offices

Finance Report, delivered by Laura Barry (with Valerie Anderson)

Valerie: We are out of a deficit. We received a credit from the diocese that was related to COVID.

Laura: Our budget is at a \$32,000 deficit. We had an increase in stewardship, but the heat and electricity budget is higher.

Questions from Chris Mills:

- 1. What assumptions were made is creating this budget?
- 2. Why do endowment disbursements not appear in the budget?
- 3. Why are pledge receipts not noted in the budget?
- 4. What is the rationale for a deficit budget?

Answers from Laura Barry:

- 1. We received (from the diocese) a \$35,000 credit related to COVID. We don't expect it again this year.
- 2. Endowment gifts are accepted even if there are no plans to use them. Therefore, they sit in the All Souls Facility Fund.
- 3. Pledge receipts keep coming in and are, therefore, not reflected in the stewardship budget. Some plate receipts have become pledges.

Question from Frank Ouellette: Can the All Souls Fund be used to replace the roof in the kitchen?

Answer from Laura: Yes, if the Vestry says so. It is up to us (the parishioners) to figure out how to get rid of our deficit. Fr. Sean's response: A \$32,000 deficit budget isn't ideal but we [financially] made it through COVID (without a permanent rector) so a \$32,000 deficit is not too bad. I am hopeful that we will see increases in giving.

Cutting expenses isn't easy (or even possible in some cases.) These budget numbers have stories (i.e., the light bill allows AA meetings to happen here.)

Question from Janet Ceasar: How do we know that our pledges have been received? *A:* Check your giving account in OnRealm.

Rector's Annual Report

Grace and peace to you from God our father and the Lord Jesus Christ. It is my distinct pleasure to submit to you the Rector's report for this year. What a year it has been. In many ways still feel like I am finding my way, and in some ways I feel like I have been here forever. I am inspired daily by the work that we are doing together and the amazing way the Holy Spirit seems to be moving in the special community of people.

So much has happened this year that it is impossible to recap it all in this report. What a blessing that is. That being said there are a few transitions and highlights I would like to share. We had a number of staffing changes this year. Margie Dissinger



our Parish Administrator retired from that position and transitioned to just doing the bookkeeping. She is enjoying traveling and spending time with family. Carl Klein retired as our organist and after 40 years in music ministries. Rohini Pola joined the staff as our new Parish Administrator. She brings a joy and love for this place that is infectious. Maggie Marshall agreed to be interim music director as we searched for our next person. We give thanks for all of them and their time and ministry among us.

The pages of this journal are filled with reports from many of the ministries that we have here. All of these remain vital and life giving ministries to the life of who we are being called to be in this moment. I would like to take a few lines to highlight a few new ministries that we celebrated this year. Ramps for Friends built their first ramp and we fed over 20,000 people through Rise Against Hunger. It has been such a joy to see the way you all have responded to the moving of the Spirit in these new ministries. I am also really excited and blown away by peoples reaction and response to the introduction of intercessory prayer during our worship at the 10 am service. Praying for each other is at the heart of who we are and it is nice to see that lived out.

Finally, a word about where we are and the future. It is clear to me there is an energy and spirit in the building that continues to grow. It is exciting to see so many new faces in the building as I continue to get to know the old faces better! There is a lot in store for us this year. Not least among those is a new Music Director. We are down to the final 5 candidates and I am hoping that it will be completed soon. Getting the staff all in place and working well together has been my number one goal over the last year and I am eager to see that completed. In addition we are transitioning some of our office spaces to make the work we do more effective. I am also eager for a number of other new initiatives that are in the works to come to fruition. A vibrant newcomers ministry, hospitality ministry, and a comprehensive marketing strategy chief among those.

Again, thank you for your dedication and love of this place. Thank you for your faith and passion for the Gospel. Thank you for all that you do to proclaim and show your love of Jesus Christ to the world.

One of the most rewarding parts about being Senior Warden is witnessing all of the amazing things going on at All Saints' Church. This past year, we were able more to seamlessly settle into treasured traditions like the (in-person) Shrove Tuesday pancake supper, Lessons and Carols service, and the Gingerbread Village fundraiser while adding in new activities, like building ramps for neighbors and packing 20,000 meals for Rise Against Hunger. Father Sean continues to bring a wonderful energy to our worship, life, and work at All Saints'. He has been able to bring new ideas and initiatives to All Saints' while honoring the traditions our parish holds dear. I am excited to see what this next year brings!

I want to thank the members of the Vestry for sharing their time and talents with All Saints'. In addition to reviewing the church's finances each month and approving the annual budget, the Vestry engages in robust discussions and makes important decisions that shape our life and work at All Saints'. The Vestry serves as a sounding board for Father Sean as well as for ministry leaders and parishioners with new initiatives. In this capacity, the Vestry provides feedback on new ideas and makes recommendations on how to move forward. Much of this work flies under the radar (unless you're in the habit of reading the monthly meeting minutes!), but that doesn't make it any less important. In electing the members of the Vestry, you have put your faith in this group of dedicated individuals to carry out God's work at All Saints', and they have served you well. Though not all Vestry discussions result in a motion that is voted upon, the Vestry voted to approve the following measures this past year:

- Ramp building project
- Funding for Stone Soup and permission to write grants and raise funds, as the group sees fit
- Moving vesting area to the Snuggery
- Funding the Rise Against Hunger meal packaging event
- Repairs to doors and threshold by piano
- Annual parochial report
- Annual financial audit
- 2024 budget
- Funding to move offices and update furnishings
- Breakdown of Rector's compensation (housing and salary)
- Plan for how Endowment Fund disbursements will be distributed

A final thought—as my term as Senior Warden comes to an end, and I reflect on the past two years, I am filled with immense gratitude for having had the opportunity to serve All Saints' in this capacity. My time serving on Vestry and as your Senior Warden has been a time of great personal and spiritual growth. From the moment I joined All Saints', I knew it was a special place, and each group or activity with which I engage only reinforces that notion and deepens my connection to All Saints'. Serving in leadership has allowed me to pull back the curtain and see all of the activity and people behind the scenes doing the work that makes All Saints' great. Report from Ministries:

Pastoral Care

I stepped down as head of Pastoral Care mid-year and ask that anyone who is called to lead this important ministry contact Father Sean. Pastoral Care is an ongoing, daily way of life at All Saints'. Amy Hunter leads a group of "prayer warriors" who pray daily for the needs of our parish family. Wednesday morning prayer unites 15-20 people weekly to pray and share celebrations and concerns. This ministry began in March 2020, and continues to thrive, thanks to the liturgical leadership of Amy Hunter and the weekly hosting by Laura Marshall.

The head of Pastoral Care acts as a conduit of information to Father Sean, and also checks in with parishioners in need. In 2024, we should consider revitalizing the former Pastoral Care Committee, which includes parishioners bringing communion to shut-ins.

Our Parish Administrator mails hard copies of the weekly e-bulletin to parishioners who are without computer access and always includes contact information for Father Sean.

One of our newer pastoral care ministries is our livestream service, which includes not only the weekly 10am Sunday service, but also some funerals and other special services. Brian Hunter and his livestream crew are to be commended for their faithfulness in making sure that these services are available for friends near and far.

Please call the office to share any pastoral concerns you may have and talk to Father Sean if you feel called to help with this important ministry.

Prayer Ministry Team

In 2023, Prayer at All Saints' expanded beyond its mostly on-line format. Fr. Sean invited parishioners drawn to prayer ministry to meet first Monday evenings each month in the Chapel for prayer, reflection, and Eucharist. The first parish meeting each month therefore is for prayer, helping us to live into the commitment that "prayer is at the heart of who we are." Growing out of this focus on prayer, All Saints' now has prayer ministers available during the Sunday Eucharist to pray in person with those who ask.

If you are yearning to deepen in your prayer life and to join with others in prayer, All Saints' offers many opportunities.

- Our shared worship life, of course, every Sunday and special services
- Morning Prayer Wednesdays on Zoom—Every week 15-20 folks gather to do the Daily Office. About 10 participants serve as officiants, with two people leading our prayer each week. As part of our service, we pray for concerns and joys that people share via Realm or in the Chat function. To join any Wednesday, use the link sent out on Sundays. If you wish to be on the Realm list to receive the Zoom link, service, and link to share prayer concerns, contact Laura Marshall churchschool@allsaintschelmsford.org
- The ASC Prayer Ministry Team has committed to pray daily for those who ask for prayer. In contrast to the list that is part of the Prayers of the People, which is posted in the ebulletin and prayed at our Sunday worship services, prayer requests shared with the Prayer Ministry Team are kept absolutely confidential. Team members do not discuss the requests nor do they contact folks we are praying for. The group prays for each concern for four weeks, and in some cases longer. Anyone desiring prayer is invited to email the ministry team at ascprayerministry@gmail.com. Please let us know who you are, for whom you are asking prayer, and what the concern or thanksgiving/celebration is. If you would like to become part of this ministry, you may use the same email to ask for more information about what is involved.
- The Prayer Ministry group that gathers with Fr. Sean on first Mondays—Talk with Fr. Sean or Amy Hunter to learn more about the group and to join us.

I continue to be grateful as All Saints' deepens our practice of prayer, our attention to parishioners' concerns and joys, and our centering our life in relationship with God who loves us. I hope that the coming year will offer us more chances to learn about and to practice prayer, as individuals and as a community.

Endowment Committee

The Endowment Committee is pleased to provide the All Saints' community with this update.

In the simplest terms, the mission of the Endowment Committee is to be a steward for the long-term well-being of the Parish. The Endowment Fund helps develop ASC's ministries beyond what is possible through its annual operating funds.

In 2023, the Endowment Committee said farewell to Benton Burgess. After a decade or so of faithful service to the EC, Benton took on the role of Junior Warden. We are all grateful for Benton's many contributions and sage advice to the Endowment Committee over the years.

We were pleased to add Sean Seyffert to the ranks of the EC. Sean came to the EC through the nominating committee, rather than being recruited by the EC itself. We intend to continue this practice, bringing in one or two members each year. Since joining, Sean has been a great contributor. In particular, he has brought fresh eyes to our work and helped us convey our mission in clearer language that is more accessible to the parish at large.

The other 4 members of the Endowment Committee are the same as in 2022: Steve Marshall (Chair), Beth Moore, David Cahill, and Connie Pawelczak (Legacy Society).

On April 30, the Endowment Committee hosted an informational coffee hour after the regular church service. Steve Marshall gave a brief overview of the mission and history of the Endowment Fund. It was attended by around 30 people.

In 2023, the Endowment Fund disbursed \$16,600 to the ASC budget. \$8000 was donated to Rise Against Hunger, the organization behind the parish-wide feeding event where about 100 All Saints' members created food packages for international distribution. \$2000 was given to the ASC Outreach committee to support their budget. The excess money from 2023 and previous years is held in a

separate investment account called The All Soul's Fund until they are needed. This rainy day fund currently contains \$35,600 of disbursements from the Endowment Fund.

For 2023, the Endowment Committee voted to disburse 4.5% disbursement from the Endowment Fund for use by the Vestry; this amounts to \$15,400. This is a lower percentage than in 2021, 2022, 2023 but still an increase from our typical 4% disbursement. The Endowment Committee strives to find a balance between funding imminent needs in the parish and prudent long-term fiscal stewardship.

The Endowment Fund's investments saw some healthy growth in 2023. Investment returns were up by 17% year over year, not including donations or withdrawals. Donations were about \$1300, mostly from Christmas and Easter memorials. The balance at the end of 2023 was about \$356,000, which was about \$41,000, or 13%, more than at the end 2022.

We are always happy to discuss the Endowment Fund with anyone in the Parish who is interested. If you have a specific question, or just want to learn more, please contact Steve or any other Committee member.

Stewardship

This year's Stewardship Campaign theme was 'Gifts to Feed Many'! Based on the Loaves & Fishes biblical story. Our gifts, no matter how big or small, allow us to do so much, and we are grateful for every penny. Details of the campaign can be found on the website or in the archives.

Similar to 2023, the final packet included:

- Pledge card
- Letter from Laura Barry (Stewardship Chair)
- 4 page Giving Brochure
- 2-sided financial educational piece

For those that were attending in person in the fall, we handed out as many pledge packets as possible during Sunday services in October. Those that were left were mailed directly to parishioners. We offered three ways for parishioners to turn in the pledge envelopes: Mail-in, Drop-in the offering plate, or through our online payment system, Realm. We continued to utilize a QR code on the pledge card and in the printed bulletin allowing direct link to the pledge form.

On November 12th we celebrated Stewardship Sunday by inviting everyone to drop their pledge on the offering plate during All Together Sunday. Followed by a wonderful Scavenger Hunt activity hosted by Laura Marshall & Brian Hunter.

By the end of the year, All Saints' Church collected 102 pledges for a total of \$348,901. When compared to what the same population gave last year, this represents an 8.64% increase in pledges! Overall, we have increased pledging this year by 5.1%, THANK YOU!!

Though we are still hopeful a few more pledges will come in, at the time of printing we formally lost 16 pledgers through death or departure and gained 7 new pledges. We cannot be more grateful for the generosity of our parishioners.

The cost to run the 2022 Stewardship campaign was \$135.00 out of a budget of \$250. Most of these costs come from postage and envelopes, some of which were donated.

This program year saw us working with Fr. Sean to incorporate both All Together Sundays and Chapel Sundays into our program schedule. We had an AMAZING Fall Carnival thanks to all the wonderful volunteers, but especially Emily Strunk and Joan Thomas. We also welcomed new members to our Chapel team- Deb Forsberg and Jess Maloney- we have chapel services on the last Sunday of each month, led by our children in worship.

The Youth Group had a rocking fall of field trips and service projects- they ran our Halloween Party and painted new scenery for the Pageant.

The Christmas Pageant was an amazing experience - our kids helped each other tell the story of Jesus' birth in a sincere and joyful way. I was so proud of all of them. Thank you to everyone who helped make this possible!

Finally, I want to say a special thank you to Joan Thomas, who helps me all the time and is an amazing friend and assistant, to Katie LaRochelle who not only leads an amazing program for the Wonder Class but keeps us all connected and organized as chair of the church school council, and Fr. Sean, for saying "yes" and bringing his faith, leadership and fun into our program.

2023 actions and events:

ASC Live-Stream Report

The ASC Media team continues to live stream Sunday and special services. Our goal is to make church more accessible and provide a way for anyone searching for a church community to give us a peek. One recent example – A recent note from Maggie:

"Shortly before Christmas, I stopped by Sunny Acres for a very short visit with Linda Webb and played her the tail end of Lessons and Carols. She was singing along quietly and the end - darkness and candlelight, actually brought on tears.

I went back again today with iPad in tow to watch most of the rest of the service. Her roommate was also listening in. The clarity of sound, the panoramic or subject specific shots - Linda was hanging on to every word and shot. She thanked me so effusively, as did her roommate. I could not have brought church to her without your help. I know we made her day."

Some Stats:

- We have 5437 views in 2023. 4006 in 2022.
- We streamed 66 services. This includes a few memorials and additional services around Easter and Christmas.
- We averaged 82 views per stream depending. Standard Sundays averaged about 55 and the special services about 100.
- Our largest viewership was 137 for William Macomber's memorial. (In 2022 it was 222 for Sean's first service)
- We have 130 subscribers, 29 more than this time last year.
- 74% of our views came from non-subscribers.

We continue to need 2 more team members in order to have a larger rotation in this ministry. Please help us bring ASC to our wider community. We invite everyone that is interested to come see the process (no strings attached).

Food for Friends

Saint Paul's Soup Kitchen is located within the Eliot Church in Lowell. Each day (Monday-Friday) a group of volunteers from numerous local churches prepares and serves food to the homeless from 5-5.45pm. All Saints' has been a part of this network for many years. We serve the second Wednesday of each month. There are four teams of about 6-8 people, so each member serves three times per year. The teams shop, prepare the food (2-4pm) at the All Saints' kitchen, transport to Lowell, and serve the homeless. Numbers served vary as the year and seasons change. During the summer we have typically served 40-60 guests. However, as the weather gets colder we have served 90-110 for the last few months. The homeless crisis in Lowell appears to be growing and numbers are rising quickly.

Any parishioner who wishes to take part in this essential ministry can contact me for more details. Preparing the food takes a few hours and is a great way to meet other parishioners and have fun. The Food for Friends program was funded by proceeds from the Gingerbread House Fundraiser, generous member donations, and supplemented by budgeted funds. We are extremely grateful for donations in any amount to help keep the SPSK running as they struggle to feed hungry people in the area 5 evenings a week.

Angel Tree

As part of the outreach ministry, All Saints' continued its participation in the National Angel Tree Program (affiliated with Prison Fellowships). Beginning in August, incarcerated mothers and fathers, with support from their prison chaplains, applied to have their children receive Christmas gifts. In October, All Saints' list of assigned children was received and all caregivers were contacted to confirm their willingness to participate in the program and for gift suggestions for the children. While the prisoner provides suggested gift ideas, many times the caregiver has a better idea of what is most appropriate or needed.

All Saints' requested & received names of (45) children with the plan for two gifts to be purchased for each child. The children's ages varied from 1 to 17 years from 24 families. 16 families, representing 32 children, agreed to participate. Thanks to the generosity of the congregation, a total of nearly 78 gifts were provided and over \$1025 in grocery store gift cards was divided among the families. All families also received an invitation to join us in worship at any time and some age-appropriate Gospel booklets for the Children and the caregiver.

A special thank you to Betsy Hirst for helping make phone calls to the care-givers, the Youth Group for organizing and wrapping all the gifts, and Cynthia Bennett for help with gift deliveries. Thank you to all who purchased gifts/gift cards or helped in gift preparation and delivery. As always, we appreciate the logistical support and guidance from Parish Administrator, Rohini Pola, and our Rector, Reverend Sean.

Refugee Immigration Ministry (RIM)

Hanifah and the three boys continue to do well. Hanifah is working at the same place, which provides transportation as they do not have a car. The two younger boys are doing well in school: the oldest graduated from Lowell High School this year is attending U. Mass Lowell two days a week. He hopes to become a doctor. He is also looking for a job and has applied at the two local grocery stores but is limited by the fact that he has no transportation. If anyone has a bicycle that could be donated to him this would enlarge his range of possibilities. We are still giving Hanifah rental support and the boys received gift cards from the Angel Tree plus some clothing donated by a member of the congregation. Hanifah received a gift card, grocery card, and personal items donated by a member of the congregation.

There is good news on our other RIM sponsored asylum seeker, Rosie, a young woman from Guatemala. She needed extensive oral surgery to correct problems incurred as a result of beatings from gang members in Guatemala and it appears that the surgeries have now been completed (part of the payment assisted by donations by members of All Saints'). She has also had her asylum hearing and been granted asylum so will be seeking employment. She is living with a host family, one of whom happens to be an ESOL teacher, and her English has greatly improved.

Team Hope

The **Afghan family** sponsored by Team Hope, with which three All Saints' members partner, has had a good year. Fawad, who speaks English, found a better job and is now working on machinery as well as doing maintenance work. His wife's English has improved to a remarkable extent and she is still studying through an online class. They have three beautiful children – two girls six and eight years old – who are in school and generally enjoying life, and a boy, three years old, and very lively! They have grave concerns about their family in Kabul, who are unable to work and are suffering under the Taliban and hope to bring other family members here some day – a very complicated and difficult task. Thankfully, the whole family is now eligible for green cards, which will give them permanent status, instead of asylum status, here once they have all passed the latest medical exams. Unfortunately these exams, with the associated blood tests, are very expensive, and we are looking for a less expensive clinic.

Since they are Muslims they do not celebrate Christmas, but the children were all very happy to receive "holiday gifts" from the Angel Tree. I wish you could have seen the excitement when my husband and I arrived with large bags of gifts on Christmas Eve. "Princess Ariel" wore her princess dress all day, the Lego was under construction within five minutes, and I was treated to identification of all the animals in the animal puzzles. Dr. Seuss was welcomed with open arms.

Thank you all for your generosity to all these people who have come to us for help.

Ramps for Neighbors

In 2023, All Saints' launched a new ministry called "Ramps for Neighbors". This was proposed by Fr. Sean and is based on a similar program that his previous church was involved with in Corpus Christi, TX. It involves building ramps for people who have recently become wheelchair-bound and need a ramp to access their home. The ramps are built at no cost to the homeowner and the parish does all the planning and construction of the ramp. This ministry was approved by the vestry and is organized through the Stone Soup Outreach team. The program was presented to the parish at a coffee hour in early June and the response was enthusiastic. Parishioners donated money and signed up to volunteer for the various tasks needed to make building our first ramp a success.

In August, we built our first ramp in Westford for the recently disabled sister-in-law of a parishioner. Many, many folks participated in this effort. Thanks to everyone who helped plan, transport materials, provide food, build the ramp, or assist in any other way that day. We completed the ramp in a day and the homeowner was able to wheel his wife into their house before we left! This was a huge success and stands as a testament to the vitality and mission of All Saints'.

Since we have a long history of doing joint mission work with Central Congregational Church in both Maine and West Virginia, we asked if they would like to partner with us in this ministry. They are still considering whether they will officially join us, but some of their parishioners did help with the construction of our first ramp. They also sent us a check for \$1,400 to help purchase ramp materials.

Our long-range plan is to do several ramps a year and finance them solely with grant money. We've developed a logo and a brochure and have a team working on identifying grant sources and submitting grant proposals. (And we got our first grant recently from the diocese for \$1000.) Besides grant writing, groups are currently working on fund-raising and planning our next ramp builds. We hope to have a fund-raising event and do two more build projects this spring.
